




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





Murders Most Foul is the historical true crime wing of *Walk Talk Explore*, it Sydney's most popular crime & punishment themed historical tour operator.

Murders Most Foul was established in 2020 by historian Elliot Lindsay. Since then he has guided thousands of people through the historical laneways and streets of Surry Hills and Darlinghurst. The aim of each tour is to change how people view, experience and learn history. This is achieved by exploring big picture historical topics from the perspectives of communities and everyday people. Exploring neighbourhoods with preserved heritage so students can see and feel exactly the same cobble roads and buildings as the characters in the stories did.

But most importantly we make sure our tours are entertaining, engaging and fun.



We bring this approach to teaching history to high school students as well. Our Crime & Punishment tours have been crafted to supplement NSW HSIE educators and offer depth and diversity to the teaching of history elective subjects.




- Creating fun and interactive ways for students to learn about 'crime & punishment' with historical criminal cases involving real people, at the actual crime scenes.

Criminal Justice, Social Change, Women in History

On this tour, students will meander through dark alleys and winding lanes, exploring Surry Hills, the centre of vice and crime during the 20th century. They will investigate historical crime scenes from between 1820 and 1960 and stand at the exact spot where police conducted their investigations. Using real police evidence, students will retrace the steps of detectives and unravel the mysteries of the case, learn about the criminal justice proceedings and the reaction of the public and press.

Students will stand amongst historical buildings while studying the past using various mediums of primary sources including photos, coroners reports, newspaper articles and the bricks and stones crafted by convicts.









Surry Hills Content

Each case explored is framed within the context of a community going through a period of instability and major social changes. Surry Hills was an affluent neighbourhood in the 1880s with so little crime it didn't need a police station. After the depression of 1890, Surry Hills underwent a demographic change that resulted in it becoming one of the most underprivileged and dangerous places in Australia for nearly a century.




Between 1880 and 1910 the suburbs of Sydney were teeming with street gangs. These gangs had crazy names and would fight each other for control of the neighbourhoods. Students will learn about the *Gipps Street Push*, their war with the *Redfern Push* and the Crown Street riot.



In 1919, the veterans of the First World War returned to Sydney. Most readjusted back into civilian life, but a portion did not. Students will discover the long term ramifications the war had on working class communities.

In this case, students explore justice, In 1922, Francis Charles Kennedy was prejudice, and the legal system. 


Criminal Justice, LGBT History, Women in History, **WWII History, and African American History**

On this tour, students will explore the most notorious suburb in Australian history. Darlinghurst was a relatively well to do neighbourhood in the 19th century until it was transformed by the 1890s depression. How did a rich suburb become a slum?

Students will learn about the social upheavals of the depression and its effect on the suburbs demography. Starting in Hyde Park, students will discover the history and evolution of Sydney's 'red light district' starting in the park and winding down the lanes into Darlinghurst. They will hear about the two queens of the underworld, Tilly Devine & Kate Leigh, visiting their homes, and walking the battle grounds of the Razor Wars. Students will learn the history of Darlinghurst's LGBT community going back as far as the 1880s and the prejudices they faced.


The back lanes are full of secrets, including long forgotten crime scenes, which students will investigate using real crime scene evidence. They will then discuss the investigation, the trial and the sentence. Which will take us to the gates of the old Darlinghurst Gaol where many of the characters on our tour spent time as Her Majesty's guest.






Darlinghurst Content

Each case explored is framed within the context of a community going through a period of instability and major social changes. Darlinghurst was an affluent neighbourhood in the 1880s. By the 1920s, it was the centre of Sydney's sex industry, sly-grog trade and the Razor Wars.



In the roaring 20s, the world of organised crime was dominated by men. Everywhere, except in Darlinghurst where the underworld was ruled by two women. Tilly Devine and Kate Leigh. In 1927, these two women went to war against each other. A period of violence known as the Razor Wars.




